Grossman sold band instruments at various times under the names Champion, Hamilton, and Lavelle. This is an attempt to sort out where these came from.

- 1922 Henry (photo 1) & Julius Grossman founded Grossman Brothers Music Company in Cleveland on West 2nd St (grotro.com).
- 1923 Grossman moved to West 6th St (grotro.com).
- 1925 Grossman moved to Bolivar St (grotro.com).
- 1935 The "Champion" name was first used then later registered as a Trademark in 1943.
- 1949 Grossman acquired Trophy Plastics (grotro.com).
- 1952 Grossman acquired A. D. Grover & Son (grotro.com).
- 1953 Grossman catalog was selling Hamilton Supreme instruments.
- 1955 Grossman moved to 1278 West 9th St (grotro.com).
- 1968 Grossman Music Corp catalog offered Lavelle band instruments made in Europe.

Champion Band Instruments: (Horn-u-copia.net)

"Special" model cornet (photo 3) is a Bohland & Fuchs copy of a York Perfec-Tone and dates to the 1920s.

The Champion name was registered by Grossman in 1943 with first use given as 1935.

Cornet #4636 (below) is a William Frank American Prep stencil made in Chicago c.1934.



Trumpet #20409 is marked "Keilwerth Made in Germany" (Tony Scodwell).

Trumpet #22318 (photo 1, Horn-u-copia.net) is marked "Made by Keilwerth, Germany" and is said to have been purchased from Grossman in the early 1960s.

Hamilton Supreme cornet #59300 is said to be a Blessing Artist stencil c.1952 (photo 2). This also has a mouthpiece marked "Hamilton".

The 1969 Grossman catalog had only Lavelle brass for sale and were said to be made by a European maker.

Trumpet #491 is marked "Italy" (photo 1).

Cornet #3960 is also marked "Italy" (photo 2).
