1937 Sorkin Music Co, 251 4th Ave, New York City (*Presto*). They are selling American Trumpeteer trumpets which appear to be made by Art Musical Instruments in Elkhart.



1939 Sorkin is the wholesale distributor for Rudy Muck at 251 4th Ave, New York (*International Musician*).

1940 The new Series 97 Muck trumpets were sold through Sorkin in April (ad at right).

1946 Sorkin Music incorporates on June 21 (Opencorporates.com).

1947 The "Revere" name is trademarked by Peter Sorkin Music Co.

1951 Sorkin moves to 559 6th St in the summer (ads).

1961 Sorkin Music, 559 6th Ave (*International Musician*).

1967 Sorkin builds a new factory and moves to 370 Vanderbilt Motor Parkway in Hauppauge, Long Island (photo below). Harold Sorkin was president. The company was started in 1914 by Louis Sorkin in Philadelphia.



In 2024, this was a Union shop.

The Revere & Stradolin names were used by Sorkin post WWII.

Sources for these can vary with brass made by Kohlert or Bohm & Meinl in Germany. These probably ended in the 1960s.

One Revere sax is marked Made in France and the Dick Stable models were made in the 1930s and 1940s by Martin in Elkhart.

The Revere baritone at right was made in England between 1950 and 1967 and has the Sorkin double-S logo.

The Revere name on more modern instruments may have been made in Vietnam and have no relation to Sorkin.

The Stradolin trumpet below is from Bohm Meinl c.1969 and may have had no relation to Sorkin at this point.
